



Performance Dress Guidelines

Tavern casual

Women and men – what you’d wear to the tavern, or a casual night out. (ie, cover your body)

Casual blacks – not dressy, but makes us look more together

Women:

Black pants or skirt (not floor length)

Black top, may be with black jacket/sweater

*Scarf may be called for

Men:

Black pants (or skirt if you’d prefer)

Black shirt,

*Tie/ascot may be called for

Colourful blacks

Women:

Long black skirt, or dress pants

Black fancy top (may be glittery, etc)

*Scarf – bright colour

Men:

Black pants

Black shirt (no vests unless black)

*Tie/ascot bright colour

Casual brights – Black pants or skirt and bright solid-coloured casual tops.

Concert (or Orchestra) blacks – formal but not glitzy

Women:

Black dress pants or skirt (long or short)

White or black dressy top

Black jacket or sweater (optional)

Men:

Black suit or tux, white shirt, and all the stuff that goes with

Glitz – borders on outrageous: very dressy, formal, colourful, snazzy

Women:

Long dress, gown (any colour)

or long skirt or dress pants and glitzy top

Shawls, boas, jewels, etc.

(The more glittery, the better)

Men:

Tux (or dark suit, or kilt, etc.)

Wild bow tie, if possible

(Please note that “white” can also be off-white, cream, ivory, ecru, etc. When we’re on stage at the Playhouse or anywhere with theatre lighting, wear one of these off-whites rather than pure white because pure white reflects the lights and makes you look terrible. To make a white garment off-white, soak it in tea water. Also, don’t wear bright red; muted or off reds are OK.)

The important thing is not whether you win or lose, but how you look playing the game.
